

Rio Grande Nature Center State Park-Group Registration Form

All groups must register in advance. To do so, complete this registration form and submit it via fax (344-4505), email (tanja.george@state.nm.us or karen.herzenberg@state.nm.us), regular mail or in person. Groups are scheduled in the order that their registrations are received. The park cannot accommodate more than 60 students at one time, please plan your visit accordingly. You must complete a separate group registration form for each date that your group is planning to visit. Please note that our ability to provide guided programs are based on the availability of our Volunteer Naturalists. Guided programs are not available on Mondays or Tuesdays and require four weeks advanced notice.

The park day-use fee is NOT a parking fee and applies to all groups visiting the park whether self-guided or guided, even if the bus does not park in the lot.

Lunch at the Park

There is one group shelter that seats approximately 70 students and chaperons in front of the education building. The shelter is available on a first come, first served basis. Fees

The Park Day-Use Fee is an entrance fee, NOT a parking fee and it **applies to all groups** visiting the park whether self-guided or guided even if the bus doesn't park in the lot. The Rio Grande Nature Center State Park is an enterprise agency and most of its operating budget is earned through entrance fees. Fees are as follows:

- Bus/van (8+ seats) = **\$15 cash (exact) or check**. Note: We cannot accept credit card payments. Group leaders should get a receipt from a Park Ranger (the one who meets your bus or at the Visitors Center).
- Private Vehicle (chaperones driving separately) = **\$3 cash (exact) or check**. Chaperones may pay at the self-pay station in the parking lot. If they display a current NM State Parks annual permit or a Friends of the Rio Grande Nature Center permit on the dashboard there is no additional fee.

Your Safety and Comfort at the Park

- **Carry a trail map and cell phone. Know where you are in case you need to report an emergency and how to get out of the bosque in case of an emergency!**
- We encourage students to record their observations by writing, drawing, and photography. Please **do not collect** plants, animals, or other natural objects.
- Smoking is prohibited at the Rio Grande Nature Center State Park AND in the bosque.
- Be prepared for outdoor activity by wearing weather appropriate clothing, a hat and comfortable walking shoes. Bring plenty of water, sunscreen, and insect repellent as needed.
- The chaperone to student ratio is 1:7 for 1st-12th grade and 1:5 for kindergarten or younger. Discipline is the responsibility of the teachers and chaperones, not park staff or volunteers.
- Eating is permitted only at the group shelter. Cooking is not permitted, and the shelter cannot be reserved. Food and beverages are not available at the park, please bring what you will need.
- The Rio Grande Nature Center State Park is a wildlife refuge. Please do not climb trees or harass wildlife. To help protect wildlife habitat, always stay on designated trails.
- Please remind the bus drivers and chaperones driving separately to observe the 25-mph speed limit on Candelaria Road in our neighborhood and the 5-mph speed limit in the parking lot.

Self-Guided Time at the Park

To enjoy your time at the Park and to accommodate the other visitors, please limit the number of students in any one area to 20 or fewer.

Park Grounds

- Mariposaville Garden - pollinator habitat and garden with informational signs; south of the parkinglot
- Main Garden - native and xeric plant demonstration garden with bird feeders; south of the Visitor Center
- Outdoor classroom (in Main Garden) – a place to meet with your class(es) for a whole group activity
- Wildlife viewing areas (3) - Candelaria Wetlands at northeast end of parking lot (includes naturalist notebook tile work), Candelaria Farms Preserve at far east side of the Park, and the Observation Pond on the west side of the Visitor Center
- Group Shelter – For lunch, snack or whole group activity (note: this is the *only* area where eating is permitted) outside of the Education Center

Visitor Center (please explore these areas in small, quiet groups)

- Observation room - watch and listen to life on the observation pond from this beautiful glass-walled room; browse books from our library, examine exhibit cases
- Discovery Room - hands-on, kid-friendly displays about the Middle Rio Grande *bosque* ecosystem
- Exhibit Hall - exhibits about the Rio Grande and bosque, including a well pump that brings water up from the water table (non-potable)
- Nature Shop - educational & entertaining Nature-themed merchandise; sales benefit the Friends of the Rio Grande Nature Center...***please only five students at a time directly chaperoned by an adult***
