Coyote Creek State Park Upgrades Water System *Water Hook-ups Temporarily Not Functioning*

GUADALUPITA, N.M. – Coyote Creek State Park is modernizing its water system. Meanwhile, water hook-ups for campers will not be available until the project is completed. Three other state parks in close proximity to Coyote Creek State Park offer water hookups: Eagle Nest Lake, Cimarron Canyon, and Storrie Lake state parks.

Coyote Creek State Park has been working on maintenance projects to modernize the water system and roadways since last fall. In July of 2010 severe flooding damaged many of the roadways and parking areas. The water system is in serious need of repair due to several leaks, low water pressure, electrical issues in the well house, no water to the RV dump station, and a failing water storage tank.

The project encompasses replacing the water storage tank and several water lines and upgrading the current well house to ensure the safety of the operators. This project will also repair the water lines to the south side of the park and ensure that water is available at the RV dump station. The goal is to place and install the storage tank by early of July 2012. Once the water storage tank is installed, water will be restored shortly thereafter.
